

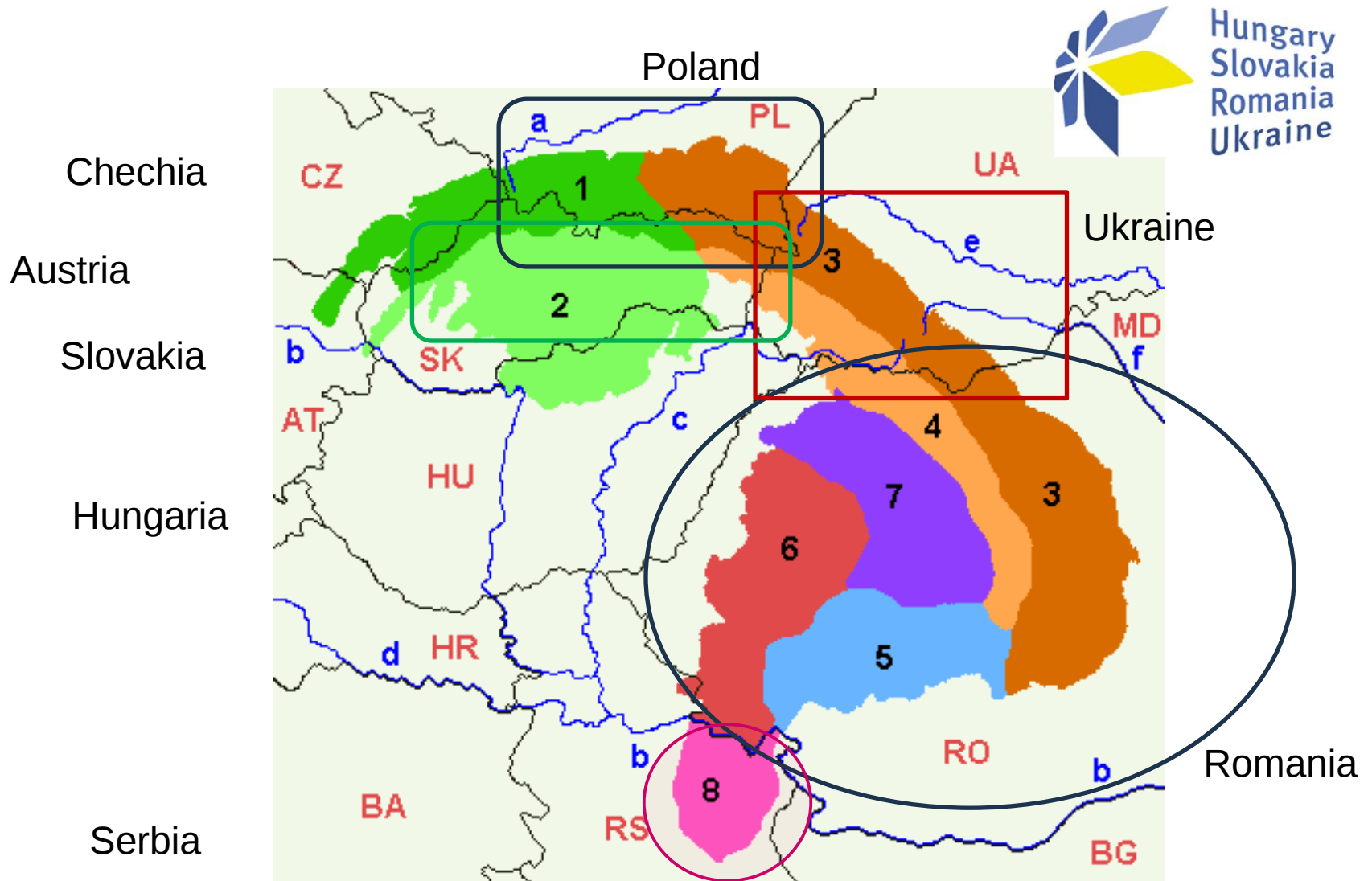

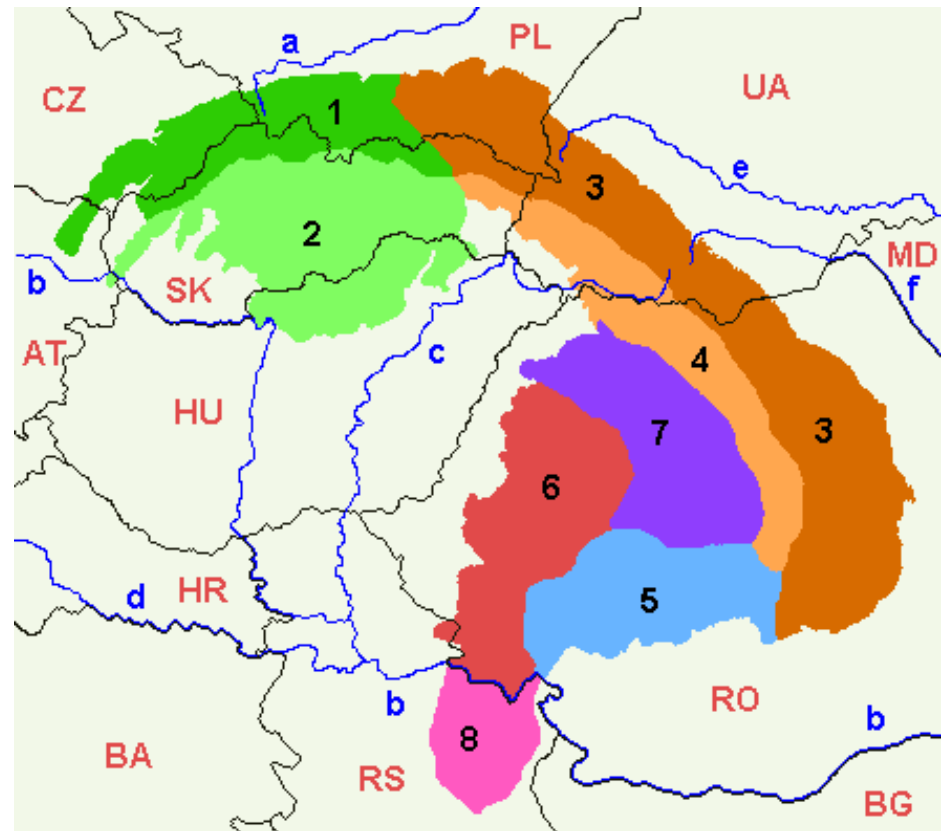

8. Serbian Carpathians

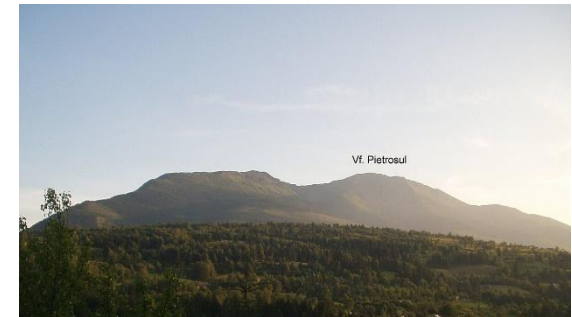
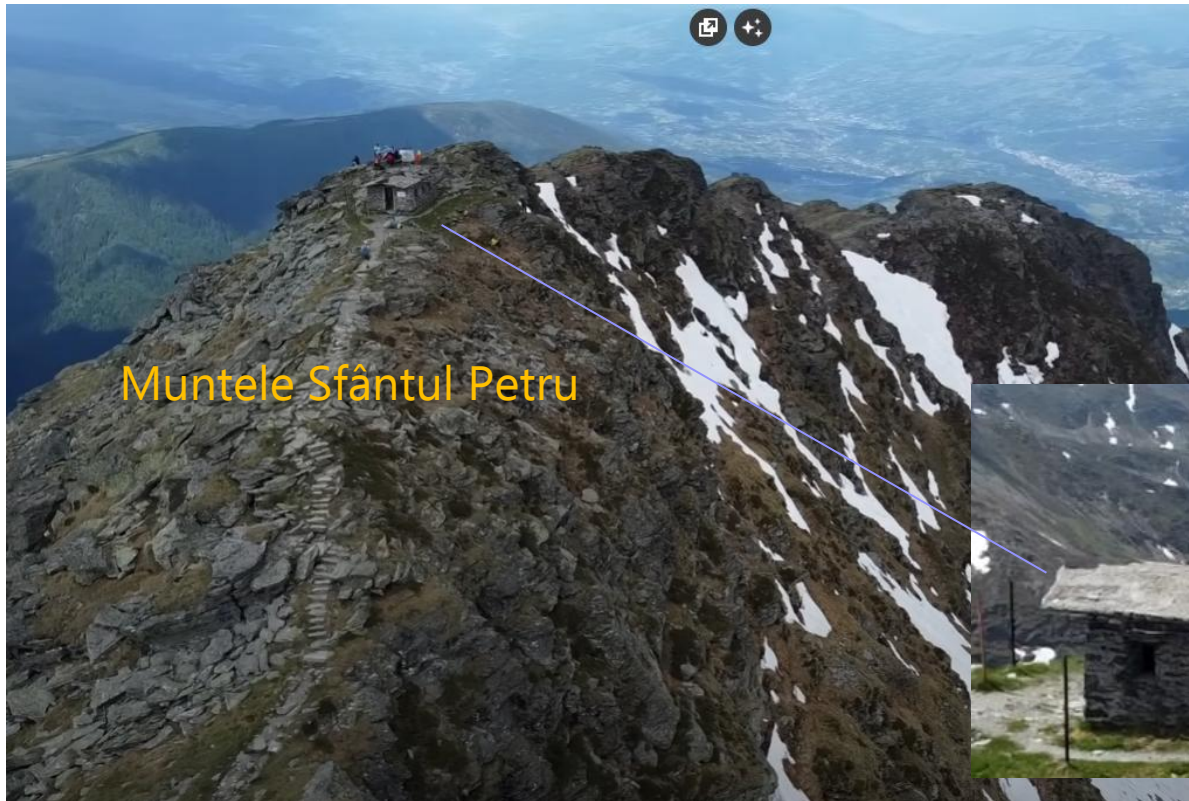

Mountain Peony

(Eastern) Carpathian rhododendron, *Chervona ruta* (Ukrainian) or **mountain peony** (Romanian: *Bujor de munte*) evergreen shrub is common in some high mountain ranges of Eastern Europe, particularly Bulgaria, Romania and Ukraine

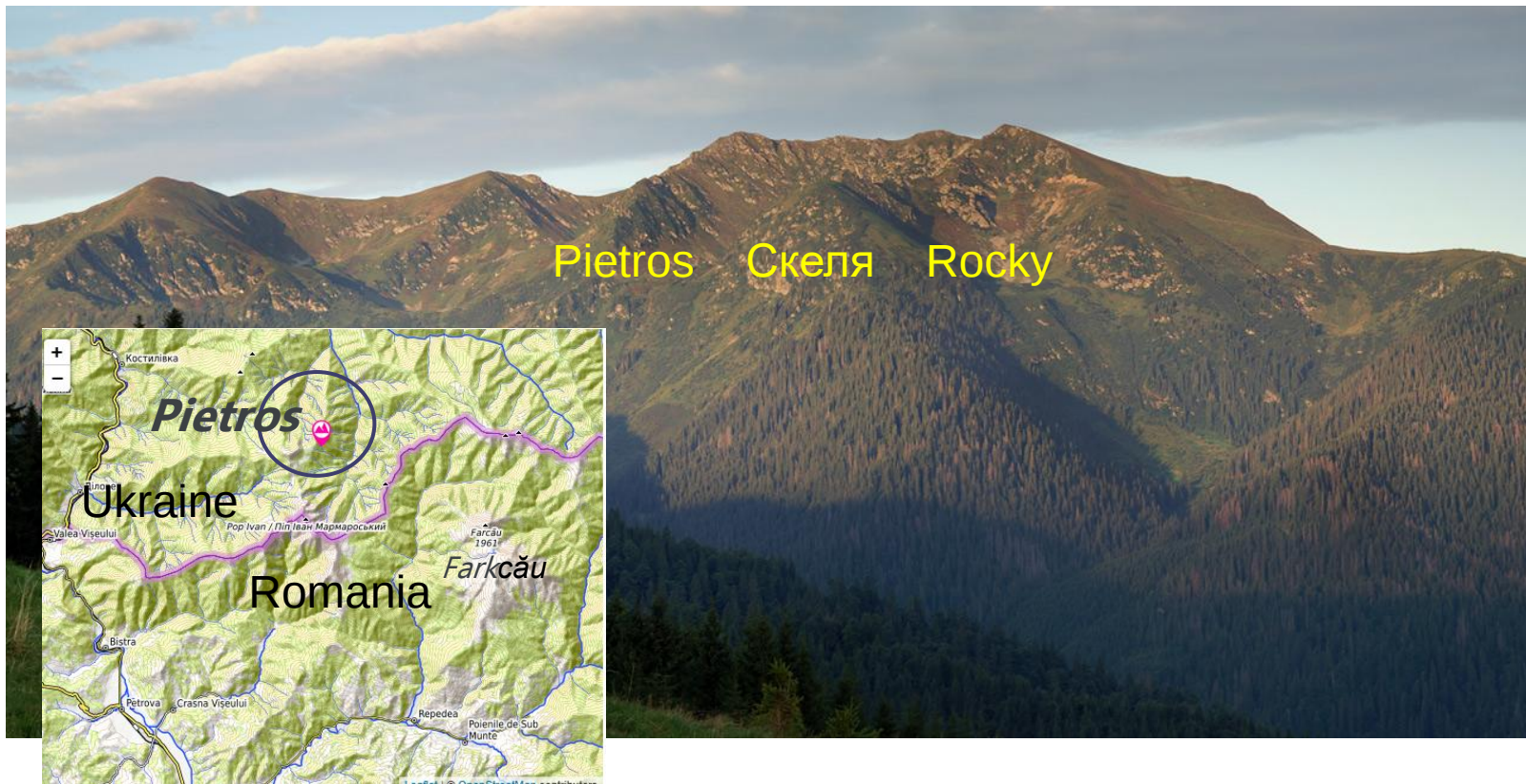

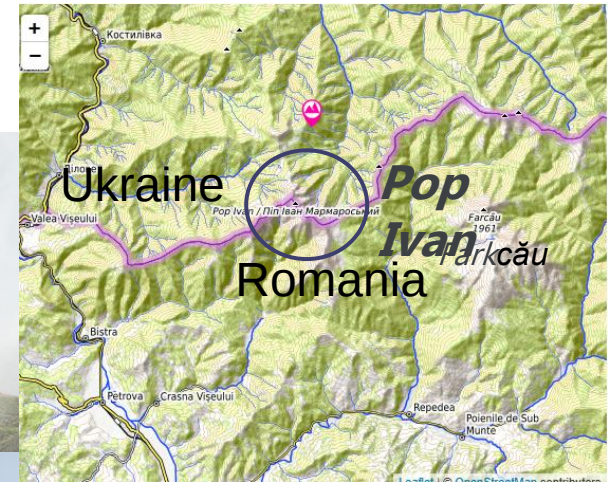

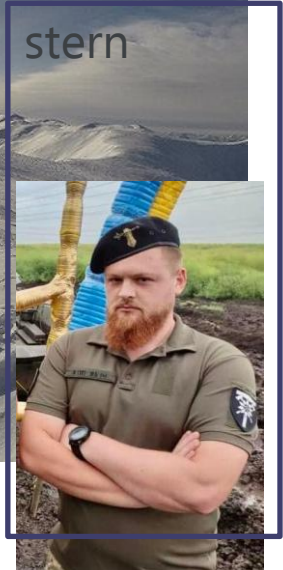

Bukovina

The official German name of the province under Austrian rule (1775–1918), *die Bukowina*, was derived from the Ukrainian бук [buk] form *Bukowina*, meaning beech tree (compare];

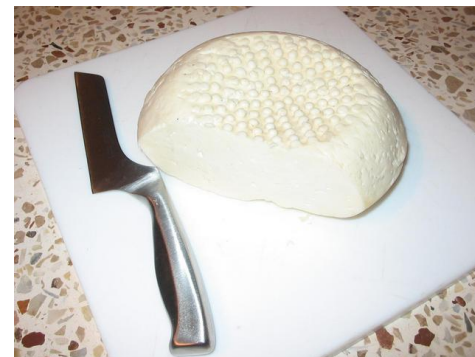

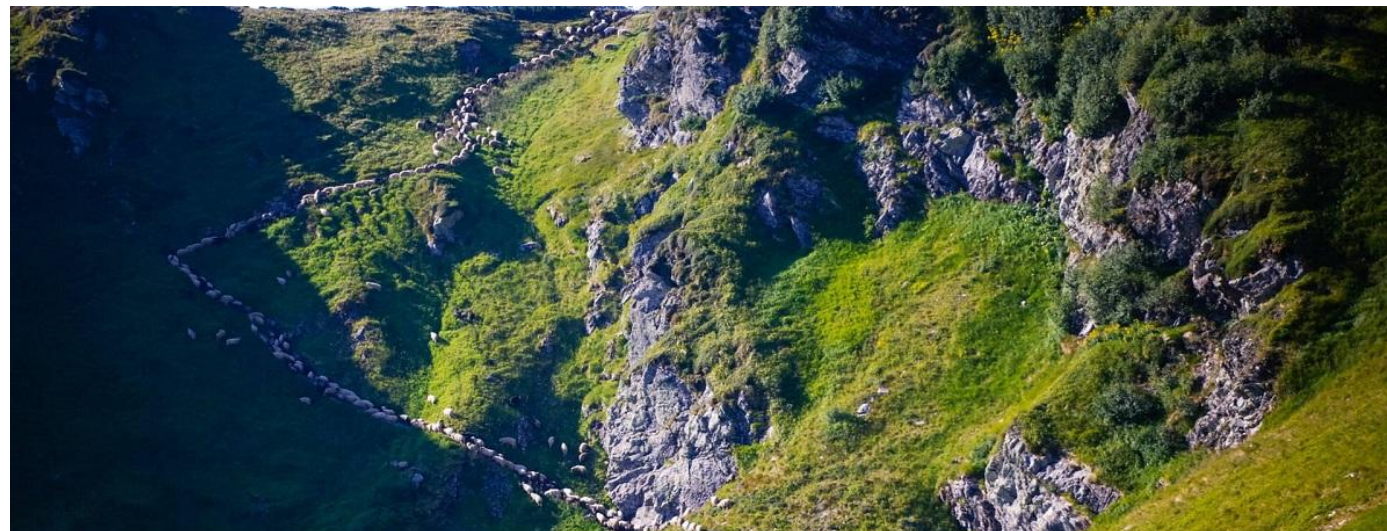

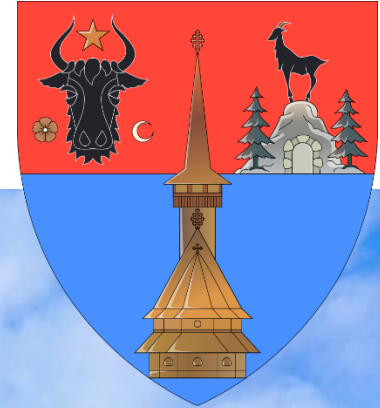
